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CHAIR'S REPORT

E ngā mana, e ngā reo, tēnā koutou katoa. I am delighted and honoured to be introducing our annual report for 2021 - and what a year it has been.

Our greatest collective challenge, COVID-19, has become a powerful catalyst for change and growth at Seed Waikato, and across the youth sector. More than ever, young adults in our community are looking for ways to connect, explore their growth, unleash their passions, and contribute in meaningful ways.

Some of the highlights at Seed Waikato this year have been:

- Supporting Te Aka Matua to foster youth sector collaboration
- Exploring digital channels to engage rangatahi in lockdown
- Supporting four youth charities to build their internal digital capacity and online presence
- Securing record levels of multi-year funding from partners for Seed's core project streams
- Growing our team of paid employees and volunteers
- Re-imagining our community-led approach
- Developing our strategy for the future.

As many of you know, our founding leader and visionary Gemma stood down from Seed Waikato in July to spend more time with her son, pursue further education and develop new ventures. Over the past four years, Gemma has been instrumental in building Seed Waikato. Her gifts of meeting young people where they are at, fanning their flames, and being a passionate advocate for revolutionising the way we support rangatahi through a community-led approach has been transformational for our organisation and the wider youth community.

As we farewell Gemma, and honour her for the incredible contribution she has made to Seed Waikato, we know she will continue to share her gifts with our community, and are excited for what she pursues next.

As part of Gemma's transition, we welcomed Tania Pointon to our Seed Waikato whānau, who has since moved into the role of CEO. Tania brings a wealth of experience in community-led initiatives and partnerships, has an incredible heart for the journeys of young people, and a passion for mentoring others around her.

Thanks to our incredible partners who have committed multi-year funding to our core projects, we have been able to take the opportunity to invest in our team. Seed's team has grown from two to five paid employees, with many more volunteers joining to support our kaupapa.

Our team have been on a collective exploratory journey, working alongside Inspiring Communities and Community Waikato, to unpack what it means for us to be truly community-led, and how we can structure our organisation to fully embrace this moving forward.

We have also recently spent time together dreaming about where we're heading and what's next in our journey.

Thank you to our incredible team of volunteers, staff, contractors, workshop contributors, advisors and board members. It is humbling to witness the magic of your mahi, and a real privilege to work alongside you all.

On behalf of our team, thank you to everyone who has been a part of Seed Waikato's journey. A special thank you to our funding partners who have supported Seed Waikato and enabled us to journey alongside young people, allowing them to be the hero in their own story.



CEO'S REPORT

TANIA POINTON

Kia ora koutou. I was welcomed to the Seed Waikato Whānau in March 2021, and i'm honoured to be part of this dynamic organisation.

The game-changing work done over the past four years has meant we now have the foundations in place to allow for expansive future growth. The ability of Seed Waikato to sense and respond to our community, has been the catalyst in our evolution. Our ability to be adaptable and flexible as we listen to the dreams of our young people demonstrates strength and commitment to our kaupapa. We are excited to launch our planned initiatives in the coming year as we continue to listen and understand how best to empower every young person to be the hero in their story.

With a city that has half of its population under 35, Kirikiroa is a place filled with creativity and innovation. In the last 12 months Seed Waikato has intentionally looked for ways to unleash the potential of the young adult community, leveraging the unique strengths and gifts to weave new possibilities together. Our heartbeat is the dreams of young people, and it's been an honour to be in followership to this community, co-creating initiatives that address the fundamental challenges around wellbeing so that they can live purpose-driven lives they love.

Alongside strengthening youth leadership and deepening our youth engagement, our organisation

has seen the strongest growth in its nearly 4 years of operating to enable resourcing for high impact. Our grants grew 200% on the previous year, providing essential resourcing to increase our paid staff from 2 to 5.

This is a huge milestone in our journey, and with this increased capacity we are building strong foundations on which our young adult community can thrive. More than 10,000 volunteer hours have been given to grow this youth-led movement, which converts to just over \$227,500 if they were paid a living wage. Our volunteers are the backbone, and we simply wouldn't be here without their generosity.

Moving from an Incorporated Society to a Charitable Trust has further enhanced functionality and allowed us space to focus on our mahi rather than intensive administrative processes. It also allows widens the scope and potential for diversified funding and contracts in the future.

On behalf of the Seed Waikato Whānau, we want to acknowledge the young people that make up our incredible community. We're inspired by your courage to show up for yourself, develop connections and learn new things. What you do with that is what fuels our mission; whether it's returning to study what you're passionate about, volunteering for causes you care about, starting a business or campaign, making your voice heard on the issues that matter most to you, finding a mentor, landing a scholarship, finding a friend, and stepping into your potential. We exist for you to live a purpose-driven life you love, and it's an honour to serve you.

GEMMA'S FINAL REFLECTIONS

Serving the youth community as co-founder, founding Chair, then founding Chief Executive of this incredible organisation and youth movement has been a privilege and honour.

As my final report, I'd like to say thank you to my incredible team of staff and volunteers for your passion, energy and generosity in bringing this kaupapa to life! To the 100's of workshop speakers, thank you for sharing your stories and gifts to create transformational moments with our community. Thank you to the 100's of businesses and funders who backed this movement. To the 1,000's of young people who shared their lived experience with myself and the team across the 12 community-led projects we've co-created together, thank you.

We've shifted young culture together through building community connections, making our voices heard on the things that matter, shifting our narrative in how people speak about this community and how we speak about ourselves, and taking action on the things we care about. I leave this organisation in a strong position, and am excited to watch a new chapter of Seed Waikato unfold from the side lines.

DIGITAL WELLBEING

OUR DIGITAL CONTENT MEETS YOUNG PEOPLE WHERE THEY'RE AT, ONLINE!

The content aims to develop community connections, provide hope, give access to real strategies to strengthen wellbeing, and elevate stories and lived experiences that resonate.

Across our website and social platforms, we posted 181 pieces of content, reaching 109,813 people. We covered topics like mindset, leadership, inequities, and social change.

YOUTH SECTOR CAPACITY BUILDING

TE AKA MATUA

We heard the youth sector wanted pathways to enhance collaboration, capability and wellbeing in the Waikato. In response, we worked to convene a group of young ethnic, queer, disabled, Pacifica and Māori leaders who represented youth organisations across the region to build whanaungatanga and co-design an experience to support that.

The collective ideated ways to nurture connection, wellbeing and self-leadership within the sector, and in April 2021, a 3-day unconference retreat was brought to life. 95 youth workers representing 27 organisations co-created the weekend together. One participant shared, "this was the most meaningful thing I have done with my time in a long time."

This first stage gave great insight into the pulse of the local youth sector, what personal and community dreams are simmering, alongside identifying leaders ready and willing to be part of regional systems change with and for diverse communities. This is where Te Aka Matua was born, and its essence captured by local illustrator, Kavita Singh, live at the retreat in these four illustrations.

Meeting fortnightly, Te Aka Matua co-design leaders, evaluated what was heard at the retreat and co-created a second gathering for the youth sector in response to the calls for more opportunities to connect, collaborate and re-energise together.

Despite the odds with COVID19, the August hui went ahead one week before Waikato entered its next lockdown. The gathering served as a timely opportunity for the youth sector to re-connect before isolating once again.


A creative evening that expressed what Te Aka Matua stands for, the hui took participants on a journey of integration, transformation and re-integration; weaving breathwork, poetry, selfreflection, and space to share voice together.


Building capacity and capability with an equity lens and using a community-led approach means that leadership development ripples out and back into the communities represented. Solutions are led by those experiencing and identifying with the challenges and aspirations, so they are designed for and by the people.


The next phase looks to making sense of the data and experience collected at both the April retreat and August hui, to inform a 3-year strategy to drive greater collaboration, connection, leadership and wellbeing within the youth sector community.


The impact of this project to-date has been far beyond what we could have originally comprehended, inspiring new types of leadership, community engagement, organising and advocacy.











YOUTH SECTOR CAPACITY BUILDING

DIGITAL CONSULTING

The project began with a community aspiration that rangatahi will have access to what we need to participate in, contribute to, and benefit from the digital world. This defines digital inclusion as a desired end state, one in which everyone is included.

Achieving this community aspiration means defining what it means to be digitally enabled, and for this project, that meant:

- Making services accessible online for rangatahi
- Increasing the reach of youth organisations
- Harnessing technology to improve back-end systems in youth organisations to deliver services
- Increasing the digital literacy of staff and volunteers of youth organisations.

In this project we mentor key youth social services to embrace a digital platform and strategically share learnings across the community development sector.

To deliver this vision, Seed Waikato is co-designing technology strategies and project managing the delivery of digital solutions for youth-focused charities: Rainbow Hub Waikato, Te Ahurei a Rangatahi, Number Twelve, and Waikato Young Workers Resource Centre.

"This project has been instrumental in lifting our digital game at the Young Workers Resource Centre. The initiative came at the perfect time – when COVID-19 restrictions were forcing us to rethink how we engage with rangatahi – and we were able to give our web presence a huge boost and improve our back-end systems to better understand the impact we're having. The support from Seed was also critical in launching our Help Centre to better respond to the disadvantages young workers are experiencing as a result of COVID-19. Though this, hundreds of rangatahi have been given access to justice and support from Seed Waikato was key to this achievement." Tony Stevens, YWRC

"Navigating lockdowns and the challenges that digital connection provides has been an interesting journey in the times of COVID-19. Since our beginnings as Waikato Queer Youth, we have supported young people of diverse gender, sex and sexuality. As we have grown as an organisation, the needs of the community have also grown. After extensive consultation, we now have the capacity to increase our scope to transform into Rainbow Hub Waikato, supporting people of all ages. From funded support through Seed Waikato, we have also been able to evolve our brand, and grow our digital presence and strategy. We are very excited about what these changes will bring to our community, enabling us to share digital resources on how to access Waikato based support, and show people that they are not alone in their identity, through positive strength-based content.
